Happy Birthday Valuemix... Here's A Pressie Of 2 New Trucks



Two new volumetric concrete mixers are starting to operate from CEMEX Altrincham concrete plant, headed up by lead driver, Ian Leadbetter, from Widnes. CEMEX Valuemix was started just over a year ago with just one vehicle and was the 'first' of this type of service in the North West.

A volumetric mixer carries the individual materials in separate bins required to make concrete such as cement and sand, and mixes them at the customer's site. CEMEX Valuemix was the first company in the North West to ensure that the mixer meets the legal requirements of

large good vehicles as opposed to many Operators who classify their vehicles as 'plants', enabling them to sidestep vital safety and operating HGV regulations.

lan is leading a Team of three local drivers - Mark Penny from Kearsley near Bolton, Craig Crier and Liam Field from Eccles. The four drivers will operate 3 vehicles providing local customers with quality assured concrete and mortars from as little as 0.5 cu metre, for a small path or paving up to 8 cubic metres for large building projects.

"Customers using Valuemix order and pay for exactly the amount of concrete they need and many ask for our "barrow and lay service", in other words, a free helping hand to lay the concrete wherever the customer needs it", lan comments.

He continues: "The service is creating a lot of interest with loads being delivered as far afield as Northwich in Cheshire, Bolton in Lancashire and, of course, all of Greater Manchester."

There is a growing trend in the market to supply materials from volumetric vehicles and currently nationwide, 10% or an estimated 2 million cubic metres of the readymixed concrete market is delivered annually by volumetric vehicles.

Having A Blast At Kensworth...



A WW2 bomb found in Wembley came to Kensworth Quarry for a controlled explosion.

Kensworth Quarry were contacted by the Met Police and asked to receive the Wembley bomb for a controlled explosion to be carried out. Throughout the day site staff were in contact with Beds & Metropolitan Police Forces, Army Bomb Disposal and Central Beds Council Emergency Team. Local information

covering the site topography, closest properties, footpaths and roads was discussed.

The Army arrived in the morning to assess the proposed blast area before returning to Wembley to prepare the Bomb for transport.

The Central Beds Emergency Team arrived to assess the need for evacuation of local residents. The local residents were not evacuated as there was a safe perimeter of 400m and a 65m chalk wall between the Quarry and the nearest houses.

The sandbags arrived but there wasn't enough and more bags were made on site. A route to the blast area was graded and a notch was cut into a pile of tipped material for the Bomb incase insufficient sandbags were ready. The local Police arrived and were advised of the public footpaths, possible access points etc, etc. These were followed by Met Police arriving in force. Volunteers with 4x4s, as part of Central Beds Emergency Team, assisted the Police with covering the footpaths. Approximately 50 Police Army Council and staff were involved.

The Bomb arrived under escort in a special truck, and after discussions with site staff, the Bomb was transferred to an Army Landrover and escorted to the blast site. Site staff assisted with the sandbags and the Bomb was set up for detonation. After set-up the Army and various members of the Police were escorted to a safe point where authorisations were received, including the CAA diverting planes at Luton airport.

At approx 17:20 the Bomb was successively detonated. Site staff were very impressed with how everything went smoothly. Quarry Manager, Martin Lithgo, would like to thank all people involved.

Have You Seen A Swift This Year?



The public have been asked to help the RSPB build up a clearer picture of the number of Common Swifts across the country.

Members of the public have been asked to look out for low-level, roof-height screaming groups of Swifts (this will mean that they're breeding nearby) or where you've actually seen Swifts nesting - perhaps entering a roof or hole in a building. The best time to look is around dusk on a warm, still evening, or in the early morning.

The charity is urging people to log their findings at: www.rspb.org.uk/applications/swiftsurvey.

If you haven't seen or heard any Swifts in your area, this is also useful to know! Common Swifts travel around 12,000 miles every year from Africa to Britain and Ireland to feed and breed. They are aerial acrobats, swooping high through the skies with distinctive scythe-shaped wings. In fact, they are such adept fliers that they eat and sleep on the wing, not touching the ground unless they are nesting.

The species likes to nest in the cracks and crevices of buildings high up in the eaves. They pair for life, meeting up each spring at the same nest site which is 'renovated' and reused year after year. Unfortunately, as old buildings are repaired or demolished, these sites are often lost which means that it can be difficult for a displaced pair to find a suitable replacement site in time to lay eggs and raise a brood, before it's time to head back to warmer climes in August.

The population of Swifts in the UK has declined dramatically in recent years and, as a result, the species is now amber-listed (of medium conservation concern). In order to help them the RSPB wants to know where they've been seen and where they're nesting.
