Last week saw the completion of the Selby Bypass for customer, NYCC. The scheme involved the planing out and relaying 30,000t of Asphalt.

binder at night, and up to 800t of HRA with pre coated chippings. The team used multiple units for supply to maintain the contract programme and to ensure that the bypass opened up on time, after being closed for nine weeks, to minimise disruption to the public.

Stay Vigilant.....

STAY VIGILANT

Despite the introduction of the Scrap Metal Dealers Act 2013 and a multi-agency task force to address the problem, metal theft continues to be a prevalent crime against industries such as ours. In recent weeks four separate offences have occurred across two

of our Quarry sites, whereby thieves have targeted copper cabling. The thefts have cost the company significant sums of money in replacement values alone, not to mention the impact on operations caused by the delays associated with safe repair.

By the very nature of our business, some of our sites are difficult to protect so it is incumbent on us all to remain ever vigilant and report any suspicious activity either to the local police and/or to company security.

There can be little doubt the offences mentioned have taken considerable time to scope and plan ahead of the act, and equally significant time on site to carry out. In a single offence thieves were able to remove 1,300 metres of CPC; scaling high rise structures to remove cabling the length of the clay conveyor. In another, offenders took the time to set a fire to assist with stripping the wire of the protective cabling before removing the core from the site. We should not underestimate the lengths these offenders are prepared to go to in carrying out these thefts.



Notwithstanding the vulnerabilities of our sites, there are a variety of measures site managers and staff should consider to prevent these offences:

- Be vigilant at all times. Challenge unusual behaviour and report the same to police and/or security.
- Where possible and safe to do so, consider burying the cable and adding additional measures such as sleepers to prevent the cables removal.
- Where fitted, ensure CCTV is in good working order and (if applicable) connected to the Security Office at Thorpe.
- Ensure staff are conversant with the CCTV recording process. In the event of an offence, recordings of an evidential value will be required by the police. (This is particularly important to sites not monitored at Thorpe - be sure you know how your DVR works).
- Sites with permanent/on site or visiting security staff should ensure those staff are briefed regarding these offences.
- Security related signage (CCTV, patrols etc) should be clearly displayed and up to date.
- Community Engagement we should remain effective neighbours with nearby businesses and residences. Ensure they are aware of these offences; ask them too to remain vigilant and we will offer the same courtesy in return.

The security directorate are exploring additional measures which we may be able to effectively implement across suitable sites. In the meantime, we can all contribute through awareness and vigilance. Finally, and most importantly, this type of offence has the capability to render our plant and machinery live and unusually dangerous, please ensure electrical works are safe before you approach at all times.

Eversley Quarry Restoration Plan Is Runner Up In MPA Quarries & Nature Awards



Our Eversley Quarry was runner up for the Planned Restoration category in the MPA Quarries and Nature 2017 Awards event in London, hosted by BBC presenter Sybil Ruscoe on 19 October at The Royal Society, London. The award was accepted by Alex Finn, Restoration and Arboricultural Manager. Other CEMEX sites shortlisted were Tattershall Quarry, Lincs, Quartzite Quarry near Wickwar and the Attenborough nature reserve which forms part of a larger restoration of the Trent and Tame river systems.

The event attracted 45 environmental and conservation organisations as well as industry operators to celebrate the industry's contribution to nature conservation. Expert speakers contributed on current issues related to nature conservation. The event showcased some of the best examples of Quarry restoration and wildlife conservation anywhere in Europe that were entered for the MPA Restoration Awards and the MPA Biodiversity Awards in association with Natural England. A series of outstanding images were also presented as part of the MPA's Nature Photo competition. The MPA also launched Quarrywatch which will involve focused nature surveys at designated locations to gain a picture of the species colonising restored quarries and other nature sites. Local wildlife groups, individual enthusiasts and schools will also be invited to take part in the initiative.

Commenting, Nigel Jackson, Chief Executive of the MPA, said: "Once again MPA members' have demonstrated what an environmentally responsible industry can do to both protect existing and create new habitats. We could not be more proud to showcase what can be achieved by an industry that is uniquely placed to make a net gain to biodiversity."

MPA members are planning to increase the area of priority habitats on restored sites from 6,000 hectares currently to around 9,000 hectares in coming years, and increase the length of hedgerows planted from 79 km to 237 km. The area of priority habitat would be equivalent to the size of Cardiff, and hedgerow would stretch from London to Cardiff.

Crushingly Good Recycling



Both Aggregates and Readymix teams have been working hard together at Dagenham Wharf on a new project which will see the majority of London's waste concrete brought into the site, crushed and screened ready to be reused back into finished products.

Jamie Keeble, Quarry Manager, continues: "We have worked closely with the CEMEX Sustainability team to ensure all environmental permits are in place and adhered to. We have received much appreciation for 'tidying up' the unused part of the site which was holding approximately 10,000 Tonnes of unusable materials. This is a good example of us working as one CEMEX, and evidence that JUSTCI is in full swing at Dagenham Wharf.

1,000 Hectares Restored Helping Nature And Communities



1,000 hectares of land in most need of conservation has been created thanks to the special partnership between CEMEX UK and the UK's largest conservation charity, the RSPB. You may remember our partnership started in 2009 and in 2010, the Biodiversity Strategy was launched. One of the aims of the strategy was to create 1,000 hectares of priority habitat, restored land, by 2020. The target has been reached this year, three years ahead of schedule. To celebrate, colleagues from both organisations got together at Hopwas Quarry, nr Tamworth in the

Midlands to create that special 1,000th hectare.

1,000 hectares, which would covers an area twice as big as the 2012 Olympic Park in London, have been restored to provide a much needed diverse range of habitats including nearly 600 hectares of diverse grasslands, over 177 hectares of woodland, 100 hectares of heathland and 190 hectares of ponds and open water.



These habitats provide homes for 46 threatened of birds such as

Twites, House Sparrows, Swifts and Turtle Doves, plus many species
of wildlife - Brown hares, Water Voles, European Eel, Small Blue Butterfly and an extensive range of plant life including rarer species such as Bluebells.
