Just Stop And Think Every Time



Sadly, one of our contractors didn't go home in one piece last week he suffered a serious lower arm injury. The Maintenance Fitter's arm became trapped in the discharge door mechanism underneath a rail wagon while he was investigating a known fault.

There is a detailed investigation underway but it seems that this could have been avoided if a moment had been taken to STOP AND THINK before starting the task.

Michel commented: "This incident must remind us that we have to immediately take a step back when an operation does not go as planned and allow the necessary time to reflect on a proper and safe revision of your work plan. We should NEVER try and find work around on the spot; this is a reaction that always puts us in front of imminent danger. The revised permits to work that are being rolled out in all operations do include a statement in big letters to remind us about this so please make sure you discuss them with your teams."

Please think about safety every time, everyday in everything that you do. Look out for yourself and for others and ALWAYS step in if you see somebody doing something unsafe.

Remind Your Families To Take Extra Care.....



With the clocks going back one hour over the weekend and the resulting reduced daylight in the afternoons, it is a good time to remind family, friends and particularly children to take extra care when out walking. Last year pedestrian deaths in the UK increased from 20 in September to 35 in October, 50 in November and 67 in December.

We can minimise the risk of injury by:

- Wearing bright or preferably fluorescent clothing on dull days and in the evenings.
- When carrying bags or backpacks, make sure they are also bright or incorporate fluorescent strips.
- Stick to the pavements where possible.



- When crossing the road find a safe place... if possible use a designated pedestrian crossing point and avoid crossing between parked cars, on a sharp bend or close to the top of a hill.
- Keep your eyes and ears open, look and listen for traffic from all directions. Don't let hats/hoods impair your vision or headphones impair your hearing.

Firework Safety



Despite annual safety warnings, firework celebrations still end in painful injuries for too many people, including very young children. Yet fireworks can be great fun for families, not just around 5th November (Bonfire Night/Guy Fawkes Night), but also Diwali, New Year's Eve and Chinese New Year.

Injury figures support the advice that the safest place to enjoy fireworks is at a large public display - far fewer people are injured here than at smaller family or private parties. But if

you'll be having a firework party at home, you can make the occasion fun and safe for everyone by following the Firework Code, as well as some sparkler and bonfire safety tips.

Firework Code

Only adults should deal with setting up firework displays, the lighting of fireworks and the safe disposal of fireworks once they have been used. Children and young people should watch and enjoy fireworks at a safe distance. Follow these top 10 tips for a safer fireworks party:

- 1. Plan your firework display to make it safe and enjoyable.
- 2. Keep fireworks in a closed box and use them one at a time.
- 3. Read and follow the instructions on each firework using a torch if necessary.
- 4. Light the firework at arm's length with a taper and stand well back.
- 5. Keep naked flames, including cigarettes, away from fireworks.
- 6. Never return to a firework once it has been lit.
- 7. Don't put fireworks in pockets and never throw them.
- 8. Direct any rocket fireworks well away from spectators.
- 9. Never use paraffin or petrol on a bonfire.
- 10. Make sure that the fire is out and surroundings are made safe before leaving.

Sparkler Safety

Sparklers are often viewed as being harmless but they burn at fierce temperatures, equivalent to a welding torch. Follow these top tips for sparkler safety:

- It is recommended that sparklers are not given to under 5s.
- Make sure everyone handling sparklers wears gloves.
- Hold sparklers at arm's length while being lit.



- Don't wave sparklers about close to other people.
- Never hold a baby in your arms while you are holding a sparkler.
- When the sparkler has finished put it in a bucket of cold water.

Bonfire Safety

- One person should be responsible for the bonfire and children should be supervised.
- Choose a site away from wooden fences, sheds and where children will be playing.
- Never pour petrol, paraffin or meths on to a fire it's safer to use fire lighters to prevent flareups.
- Keep a bucket of water handy in case of an accident.
- Avoid loose clothing and tie back long hair.
- After the party, pour water on the fire, rather than leaving it to burn out.

"We have recently moved into new offices at the White Collar Factory, a cutting edge office building in terms of its approach to


sustainability and modern office design. There is a lot of exposed

concrete, polished finished pillars and timber slats in formwork showing exemplar work in traditional concrete construction approaches.

Within these surroundings we wanted visitors to get a feeling of innovation, experimental, and cutting edge material use. "The reception desk showcases what high performance concrete can do and how fabric formwork can be used in shape generation and high quality exposed finishes. It's a working area but a stylish working area," comments Ed Moseley, Design Director AKTII.

The project originated after executives from AKT II were introduced to the concrete technology developed by the CEMEX Global R&D team, located in Switzerland. The inspiration behind the co-created design of the desk

was drawn from the versatility and malleability of the material, together with the modern ambience already set in the AKT II offices.



The reception desk uses ultra-high-performance concrete with fibre reinforcement which enables it to have fluid curves and embedded texture. Lightweight concrete and water-repellent technology were also used in the creation of the desk.

Put The Kettle On, T-Levels Are Coming



Technical Levels, colloquially known as T-Levels, are the biggest reform to hit the English education system in 70 years. Due to come into effect in 2020, the goal of these new technical qualifications is to "bring... training for young people and adults in line with the needs of

business and industry" and to increase the number of young people who embark on a technical education.

This new system will replace the current range of c.20k qualifications that are presently being run by c.160 organisations, with 15 vocational 'routes' for students to choose from. Each route will take two years to complete and the overall goal is to present students with two clear choices: the academic route (A-levels and Degree) or the technical route (T-Levels), with bridging courses promised at 18+. Each of these routes will be delivered through college and/or employment based education. There will be a reliance on apprenticeships, with four of the 15 routes primarily being delivered this way. The remaining 'college-based' programmes have initially been assigned to new trailblazer apprenticeship groups and are presently under development; within which MP Futures have already succeeded in establishing our first sector specific apprenticeship.
