Cable Theft on the Rise – Take Action Now!



Our mortar plant at Peterlee, County Durham, suffered a cable theft last week. The offenders went to significant lengths to angle grind substantial sections of palisade fencing before removing approximately 30 metres of 'live' 75mm cable.

The scrap value of copper is currently at an all-time high and economists predict the current spiral is likely to continue. As such we can expect cable to continue to attract offenders.

Aside from the costs of material replacement, the site down-time caused by these offences can run to £10s if not £100s of £1,000s in lost business. Additionally, it should be noted, offenders on this and previous occasions have taken huge personal risks by removing the cable whilst live!

Site Managers are encouraged to consider the preventative measures available to them to hide cables and make them otherwise difficult if not impossible to remove. **Safely burying cables**, where possible under suitable sleepers or similar obstacles, are often effective actions.

Colleagues at Peterlee have managed to enclose the replacement cable into steel tubing, welded into position along the fence line providing an imaginative alternative to the option to bury the asset.

CEMEX have partnered with forensic marking specialists, SelectaDNA, enabling us to <u>mark cable and other high value assets with a unique solution</u>, identifying such assets using an ultra-violet solution with an intrinsic DNA identifiable only to CEMEX. Testing, Testing....



Impressive work from the team at Rugby cement plant as they set up a COVID testing and briefing facility in just ten days ahead of the annual maintenance shutdown, when 700 contractors arrived on site.

The team hired a warehouse unit with no power or lighting and built an operation the military would be proud of! Over 3,000 tests have already been completed.

No More Push and Pull



Following a risk assessment at The National Technical Centre, the Technical team has altered a work practice to reduce manual handling and rely more on mechanical aids.

Previously the team would stack cubes for compressive strength testing onto trolleys and push these from one building (where they are stored for curing) to the lab where they are tested for compressive strength. They have had some bespoke cages manufactured which can be loaded with cubes, transported by a forklift and then the cage placed on the trolley for final manoeuvring into the correct lab for tests. The benefit of this is a reduction in manual handling for the teams.

Something a bit different!



It isn't just the UK which tries to work with nature on sites, CEMEX Dominican Republic has collaborated with Birdlife International and Grupo Jaragua since 2013 to work on a Biodiversity Action Plans. April's Thanks For Your Effort Award



The winners are the David Addison, Dave Eaton, Neil Sippitts, Stuart Andrews and Steve Evans Rugby Cement Production and Maintenance team for acting promptly and professionally when a contractor sustained a serious injury.

Shortly before midnight and during the major overhaul at Rugby cement plant, two contractors were working inside the fuel mill carrying out highly specialised machining work to the fuel mill table. Unfortunately, a safety incident occurred

involving their complex equipment which caused a significant leg injury to one of the contractors. The incident was witnessed by the CEMEX Supervisor, Dave Addison, who immediately sought emergency support.

Dave Eaton, Neil and Stuart as CEMEX First Aiders and Emergency Responders, provided invaluable medical support to the injured person whilst waiting for the emergency services to arrive. Steve played a critical role in coordinating the emergency response. The scene was particularly gruesome due to the extent of the injury and complicated by access challenges and the sheer size of the equipment involved.

Without their immediate, professional, and calm response, the outcome would likely have been very different, potentially resulting in the loss of the injured person's (IP) leg or worse. The IP suffered multiple fractures and a large laceration to his leg with significant blood loss.

The Police commented that the overall site response was 'first class', and whilst many others were involved during the emergency, the individuals nominated went well above the call of duty and ultimately saved the IP's leg whilst dealing with a difficult, disturbing, and graphic scene.

Hugh has successfully managed and completed our FORS Silver and Gold renewal submissions for Supply Chain this year and we have now been awarded the FORS Gold standard certificate as a recognition of his and the company's efforts. The submissions

require weeks of work in collating and collaborating all the required information from different areas of the business as well as liaising with FORS and other external parties.

Site Fitter was unable to attend as he had been instructed to self-isolate through track and trace and John had worked the previous nightshift. After several phone calls the problem was diagnosed and Luke sourced the replacement part from an out of hours supplier. He had also contacted his father, Dave Tyghe who is Assistant Manager, over at Salford Plant. Dave duly offered his services to assist Luke in getting the plant up and running. The part didn't arrive until 8.30pm which meant the pair did not leave site until 11.00pm!

Gemma Crawford and Paul Cooke, Planning and CS Manager and RMX Freight Manager, Supply Chain. Following an unplanned event with the kiln at Rugby over Easter which impacted on cement availability, there was the need to very quickly develop a plan to determine how the available cement would be distributed. Gemma worked closely with the Cement Commercial team and the Internal Readymix team to coordinate this process. In addition, Paul would coordinate with each of the General Managers how many loads would be supplied each day into each market and to which plants, and then liaise with Gemma to ensure she had all the information required. A similar process was also in place between Gemma and the Commercial team. This continued for the whole of April which was an extremely challenging period for both Gemma and Paul (and their respective teams).

Julie Welch and Frances Bott, Health & Safety Manager and Health & Safety Info. Systems Analyst. Julie and Frances worked together to produce a very simple and clear training programme to raise awareness of the need for defensive driving. ASPHALT



AVOID CONTAMINATION OF REPROCESSABLE ASPHALT STOCK

A number of our sites hold asphalt/plant returns from surrounding plants for the purpose of reprocessing and onward distribution and use.

This material is crushed into Recycled Asphalt Product (RAP) and sent to appropriately enabled asphalt plants for use in finished bituminous products.

There is a risk that the stockpile of asphalt/plant returns awaiting processing becomes contaminated with uncoated aggregate, construction waste, general waste, kerbs, metal and other such materials deleterious to the process. A few examples from our sites are shown below:



LEARNING POINTS

- Asphalt allocated for reprocessing should only be from returned/tipped loads.
- There should be no construction waste e.g. kerbs, bricks etc sent for processing
- There may be a small amount of uncoated material present but not large quantities.
- Plant clean outs or construction waste from customers should be stored handled separately to RAP feedstocks
- The higher the percentage of construction waste present, the more the overall proportion of bitumen contained within the RAP is reduced. This impacts the financial benefit of the RAP and overall quality.
- If you see contaminated return stock please raise with site management.
