Safety Alerts



So far this year in the UK we have recorded two Lost Time Injuries (LTIs), both involving contract drivers. The drivers suffered serious injuries that will keep them off work for some time. In one instance the driver lost part of the middle finger on his left hand when it was trapped in an automated tailgate clamp. In the other incident, a truckmixer driver fractured his

wrist when he misjudged the step down from the ladder at the rear of his vehicle and he fell to the ground.

The Egyptian Goose is a member of the duck, goose, and swan family Anatidae. It is native to Africa south of the Sahara and the Nile Valley. Egyptian Geese were considered sacred by the Ancient Egyptians, and appeared in much of their artwork.

Join the Wildlife-Planting Revolution



The RSPB is calling for everyone to join the wildlife-planting revolution as a new YouGov survey shows that three quarters of people are already trying to encourage wildlife to their garden.

The survey, commissioned by the RSPB as part of their Nature on Your Doorstep campaign, also revealed that over two in five now consider pollinators when choosing what plants to grow in their garden, a quarter (24%) leave areas of grass to grow long for nature, and that nearly half of people feed birds (49%).

Planting for wildlife in gardens and outdoor spaces presents a fantastic opportunity to help struggling wildlife and is also a hugely popular activity. When asked in the survey to choose what one thing they would most like to do in a new empty outdoor space, half of people (50%) chose having more plants (either having a wildflower meadow (most popular at 16%), or planting fruit trees (11%), other kinds of trees (6%), shrubs (7%), or space for more flowers (10%)).

Here are five wildlife-friendly, easy-growing plants to get anybody started:

- Sunflowers beautiful and easy to grow from seed, these classic flowers are great for pollinators and are a great food source for birds when they set seed.
- Cornfield annuals for just a couple of pounds you can have the glow of red poppies and blue cornflowers within weeks.
- Mini-meadow just let parts of your lawn grow for a few months, or even better until late summer, and be rewarded with drifts of clovers and other meadow flowers.
- Lavender, the familiar lovely-smelling herb that's brilliant for bees and butterflies.
- Foxgloves, tall purple, pink and white flowers that are bee magnets.

Continuing our Support for Ukrainian Refugees



As the situation in Ukraine continues, the humanitarian crisis deepens with mounting military and civilian casualties and over 3 million on the move to escape the violence.

SAFETY ALERT



DETAILS OF THE INCIDENT

After washing down the truckmixer chute from the rear platform at the end of the day, an independent haulage contractor descended the ladder. On stepping down to the ground, the driver misjudged the floor level, lost his balance and fell, in doing so he fractured his wrist.

KEY FINDINGS

- · Housekeeping and ground conditions were good
- The wash area was free from slurry
- There was good natural lighting in the area.
- The drivers PPE was in good order including his boots.
- The drivers had been inducted to site.
- The drivers CPC was up to date and he is in possession of MP Connect Card.
- Video evidence showed the driver was not rushing.
- The access ladder was in good order.
- The truck was clean and tidy with no defects.
- Monthly inspections of the truck are undertaken.
- The driver has 24 years experience.


KEY REVIEW POINTS

- Are get a grip principles practiced and enforced?
- Are there robust inspections schemes and maintenance programmes in place?
- Are wash areas regularly inspected and cleaned?

DRIVER SEVERS FINGER ON AUTOMATED TAILGATE

DETAILS OF THE INCIDENT

In the early hours of the morning, when it was dark, a contract tipper driver was carrying out his pre-start vehicle checks. These included opening the automatic tailgate to check for contaminants from the previous load. He then activated the switch in the cab to close the tailgate. Due to the engine only just being started, the lack of build-up of air in the tanks delayed the closure of the air activated tailgate and the clasps which secure it in place. The clasps closed as the driver was cleaning the tailgate, severing the middle finger on his left hand, which later had to be amputated in hospital.

KEY FINDINGS

- When the vehicle air tanks are fully charged, the operation of the tailgate clasps closing takes approximately 4 seconds. On this occasion it took 11 seconds.
- This is a task the driver carried out daily and had not recognised the risk previously.
- The swift actions of the site personnel helped getting the injured person the emergency assistance he required.

HOW COULD THIS HAVE BEEN AVOIDED?

- This is a task which could be carried out daily by a driver for cross contamination/quality purposes.
- A driver needs to be aware of the delay in the closing mechanism of an automatic tailgate when the vehicle's air tanks are not fully charged.
- Drivers should remain in the cab prior to undertaking the pre start check to ensure air in the vehicle is fully energised.


KEY REVIEW POINTS

• Ensure drivers are reminded of the hazards associated with tipper tailgates through induction and ongoing training.



Safe Systems



Follow safe systems of work, site rules, signage and traffic signals.



Safety Checks

Carry out your vehicle checks before driving and make sure your load is stable and secure.
