## Partnership Update

I'm continuing my visits to quarries, familiarising myself with Cemex sites and earlier this month, I visited the restored and non-quarried areas of Rugeley in Cannock Chase, Staffordshire with Sean Cassidy, Cemex EMEA Biodiversity Manager. We saw a Woodlark, which is a special heathland bird, feeding in an area grazed by the Belted Galloway cattle. It uses the short sward for feeding, showing the benefit of the grazing.

I also joined Cemex Development Manager Matt Shorland, for the Cannock Chase National Landscape Annual Conference. It was an inspiring and interesting day, hearing about the conservation work other organisations are doing and how the National Landscape Network is supporting by connecting people with nature and green finance. It was a thought-provoking day, helping us to consider how Cemex fits into the jigsaw of land management on Cannock Chase and helping deliver the new Management Plan. It was useful to make new contacts and there was much interest in the fenceless grazing (which we are doing at Rugeley).

### **Actions for Nature**

#### Take part in the Big Butterfly Count

Counting butterflies is fun so why not take part in the Big Butterfly Count from 18th July to 10th August. It's easy to do and there's plenty of information to help identify butterflies if you don't know your Peacock from your Meadow Brown. The records help inform a national picture of trends in butterfly numbers across the UK. This helps give more robust and repeatable evidence from citizen science rather than anecdotal comments.
